HOW TO ENGAGE LATINO FAMILIES

The Latino Policy Forum trains and equips staff from school districts and non-profit organizations to engage Latino families early on in their child's education. Through the Forum's *Abriendo Puertas*/Opening Doors Facilitator training, staff become equipped to increase opportunities for effective parent engagement within their schools. *Abriendo Puertas*/Opening Doors is an evidence-based parent engagement program for primarily Spanish-speaking parents with children 5 years and under. The program equips parents with the knowledge and tools to prepare their children for kindergarten by supporting their early development.

COST EFFECTIVE PROGRAMMING

The Forum's train-the-trainer model enables school districts to reach parents in their schools and communities, and continue implementation of the program on an as-needed basis. The three-day training prepares staff members to:

- Deliver the curriculum and enhance their facilitation skills
- Use culturally relevant activities to develop parent leadership
- Enhance parent engagement programming through innovative recruitment and retention strategies
- Use the curriculum on its own or combine with other parent engagement programs

CURRICULUM KIT

The user-friendly curriculum kit was designed to increase parent engagement within the public school system. The 10-session kit comes fully equipped with modules that include detailed agendas, objectives and comprehensive scripts for each session. Available in Spanish and English, the 10 sessions foster school readiness, family well-being, and advocacy by addressing best practices in:

- Early childhood development
- Language & Literacy
- Health
- Attendance
- Advocacy within the public school system

Staff members trained in the *Abriendo Puertas*/Opening Doors curriculum enhance their capacity to:
